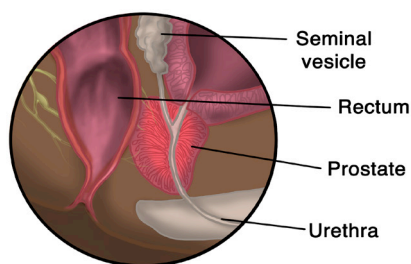
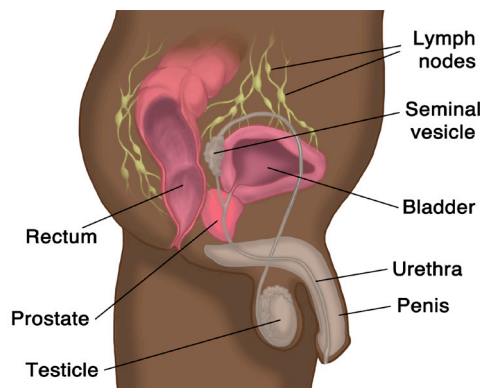


# Prostate Cancer Screening

**1. Am I at an increased risk for prostate cancer? What are the possible symptoms?**

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**2. What are the risks and benefits of screening for prostate cancer?**

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**3. Would you recommend prostate cancer screening tests for me? If so, which test?**

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# Prostate Cancer Screening

If you are having a PSA (prostate-specific antigen) blood test and/or DRE (digital rectal exam) you will want to know:

**4. What is involved in the test(s)? Will it hurt? Is the test safe?**

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**5. Where can I get the test(s) done? Who will do the test(s)?**

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**7. When will I be contacted with the results? Who will contact me?**
